I. World History/Model United Nations

The Model United Nations program is a four year co-curricular program that integrates World History with the examining of international issues through the representation of diplomats of various countries around the world. The students will discuss various international issues that are of the utmost importance to the international community and attempt to develop solutions to solve these worldwide problems.

Students in the program not only gain knowledge about international issues, but also learn more about what is going on around the world, learn how to become a better citizen, become more active in school activities and events, as well as developing and refining their skills in negotiation, debate, research, analysis, writing, reading, speaking, and conflict-resolution. The students will also gain a new perspective on the world and will help them in adapting to the world they will enter beyond their secondary education.

The program is not only geared towards students hoping to become diplomats, politicians, or lawyers. The skills developed within the program can assist any student in their future studies or future careers as reading, writing, and communication are important in any field.

Advancement in the program is based on academic performance in the classroom and overall GPA, behavior and citizenship, effort and development, as well as performances at conferences. Awards may be used in evaluating students however, will not be the sole determining factor in advancement.
